The latest gadget or a new type of clutch control for the car, a new style of racquet in tennis, or of club in golf and innumerable other examples show that man is just as sensitive to the applause or scorn of his fellow creatures as woman is.

With both sexes, it is largely a matter of pride, an inward fear of being unable to compete with their friends, their colleagues and members of the circle of society in which they find themselves. There is, of course, in addition to this pride, a natural satisfaction in having a dress or a car that by its appearance immediately calls forth admiration, but deeper than this, and quite apart from the desire to be fashionable, is man's natural joy in possessing the best that modern design or invention can offer him. This feeling is often accompanied by a belief that, in some mysterious way, the acquisition of the latest and best in either dress or machine brings the owner opportunities for improving his or her position in society and business.

Little wonder then, that both sexes fall a prey to the lure of fashion and live continually with an eye on their friends and rivals, always trying to make sure that no unfair advantage is scored over them because they have lagged in pursuit of the latest developments. It is regrettable that often such an attitude tempts men and women to live beyond their means; in consequence, perhaps on occasions even the bare necessities of life are forgone in order that the latest trend of fashion may be followed. Such

sacrifices are the price that the slaves pay, and cheerfully pay, to their master.
